UNDERSTANDING BIBLE NUMBERICS AND THEIR SIGNIFICANCE IN PROVING THE DIVINE INSPIRATION OF THE HOLY BIBLE

Article Three

Matthew 1-2 Christ's Genealogy/Birth/Childhood, Mark 1:1-8, Chain Features

A-Genealogy:

The first seventeen verses of the Greek New Testament consist of two main sections, versus 1-11 and 12-17. Each section contains amazing numeric features in the structure of the text:

1 – The number of Greek vocabulary words is exactly 49 (7x7).

NOTE: The **number** of words in a phrase, sentence, verse or chapter refers to **ALL THE WORDS** and the **vocabulary** of words is the **DIFFERENT** words used – **no duplicates**, e.g. only one "the" when two or more are present.

- 2 The **number** of letters in these 49 words is exactly 266 (38x7).
- 3 Of these 266 **vocabulary** words, the number of consonants is 126 (18x7).
- 4 Of the 49 words mentioned above the **number** of words which begin with a vowel is exactly 28 (4x7) and the **number** of the words beginning with a consonant is 21 (3x7).
- 5 Of the 49 words the **number** of nouns is exactly 42 (6x7). The **number** of words which are NOT nouns is 7.
- 6 Of the 42 (6x7) nouns in the first *eleven* verses, the number which are **proper nouns** is 7.

NOTE: In these 7 nouns alone there are more than 20 numeric features which could be given! Remember, Dr. Panin's equations filled 43,000 pages! We cannot, of course, provide all of them, just enough examples to prove how Numerics can prove the inspiration of a divine Being, God. It would take a mathematician many hours to figure out all of them! Dr. Panin already did, so we pass what we know of his works to all of you so that you can use this information in your ministries. Most of the Old Testament is still waiting to be done. Larger than the New Testament, this task would take many years more than what Panin spent to provide the codes for all the New Testament!

- 7 The **number** of times proper names occur is 63 (9x7).
- 8 Of these 35 proper names given in the first 11 verses of Matthew, the **number** of male names is 28 (4x7). The **number** of female names is 7.
- 9 The **number** of times these 28 male names occur is 56 (8x7).
- 10 In the first 11 verses, 3 women's names are mentioned Tamar, Rahab and Ruth. The **number of Greek letters** in these three names is 14 (2x7).
- 11 Just one city is named in these verses, namely, Babylon. The **number of Greek letters** in this word is 7.

- 12 Of the 49 Greek **vocabulary** words in the first 11 verses, the **number** of words which occur more than once is 35 (5x7). The **number** of words which occur only once is 14 (2x7).
- 13 Of the 49 Greek **vocabulary** words, 42 appear in only one form (6x7) and 7 appear in more than one form. The numbers are not obvious when just reading these verses, but they are there to be discovered by searching and doing calculations. This is far beyond the skills of most of the authors that have written the books of the Bible!

Verses 12-17 contain many more equations, which I will not enumerate here. The entire Bible is full of thousands of examples of this wonderful coding that God has provided for us. We need to understand and use this wonderful truth in our ministries. Simple math can be understood by anyone. That is why I am not giving the advanced formulas beyond what is provided in my **Power Point presentation on Bible Numerics**. Those formulas do not mean much to most of us, but it is wonderful to those skilled in math! (Available on http://www.biblemapsplus.com)

B-Christ's Birth, Matthew 1:18-26:

Two main features for this section are extremely important:

- 1. The number of Greek **vocabulary** words is 77 (11x7).
- 2. The number of vocabulary words the angel used in speaking to Joseph is 28 (4x7).

Note: Even this small message has amazing numerical features of its own! Even though it is a separate message, it also fits in completely with the overall Numerics of the whole chapter.

C-Christ's Childhood, Matthew 2:

- 1 The **number** of Greek **vocabulary** words in the second chapter of Matthew is 161 (23x7).
- 2 The **number** of Greek **letters** in these 161 words is 896 (128x7).
- 3 The **number** of Greek **vocabulary** words in the first six verses divides perfectly by 7 = 56 (8x7).
- 4 There are 3 speeches in the chapter. Herod speaks, the wise men speak, the angel speaks. Each speech shows

 Numeric features in itself, yet each forms only part of the chapter, which as a whole has phenomenal features of its own. Each division alone shows the same Numeric phenomena found in the chapter as a whole.

D-Mark 1:1-8:

- 1 -The **number** of Greek **vocabulary** words in these first 8 verses is 77(11x7).
- 2 Of the 77 **vocabulary** words, the **number** John used in his speech is exactly 21 (3x7).

Note: This mathematical phenomena continues all through the chapter and, actually, all through every book in the New Testament! Using Panin's ancient Greek version of the New Testament, you can go through all of the books yourself if you have the math skills to accomplish it. This only works with the **original Greek letters**, not with the Modern Greek versions.

The order of the Bible books, as mentioned in the previous lesson, must follow Panin' arrangement for them in order for the Numerics to work. A few verses were left out in his New Testament version because he apparently believed they were not part of the inspired Scriptures; they did not fit the mathematical code.

Also note that the word order in Panin's New Testament does not match the modern linear versions and the word order makes a big difference in the codes working out properly. If you do your own research, you will have to rearrange the word order of the Greek words, if they differ, to match the order given in Panin's New Testament to discover the codes in them. It is time consuming but fascinating. You can do the scriptures that are important to you and show your work to those who are interested. E-Chain Features:

Note: So far we have studied simple math equations that are easily found in the Bible. The following features occur in a different manner. These are called Chain Features.

- 1. They are called Chain Features because they occur in the structure of words that are separated by great distances.

 The words in a "chain" feature are scattered throughout many different books of the Bible. They are not confined to any one particular passage, YET THEY FIT THE NUMERICAL CODE EVERYWHERE THEY ARE USED.
- 2. The names of the Bible writers, for instance, are widely separated throughout the scriptures. The number "7" is found even in the scattered occurrences of these names. The **number** of the Old Testament writers named in the Bible is 21 (3x7).
- 3. Some of these facts were mentioned in my second article on the Books and Authors of the Bible.
- 4. The Bible is literally full of these "chain" features. It takes a lot a study and researching to find them, but they are there waiting to be found. Verses matching each other, words and phrases, all through the Bible are used and reused.
- 5. I have discovered that thousands upon thousands of these numerical facts have been uncovered—they are so abundant that more than 43,000 pages have been required to contain the calculations that Panin used in discovering and enumerating the features of the New Testament alone! However, he has shown us the way to obtain these formulas for ourselves. We can do it if we take the time and effort to do so; it would also help to know enough mathematics as some of them are very intricate equations that the average person would never discover!
